SUMMER VILLAGE OF POPLAR BAY

BYLAW #239

A BYLAW OF THE SUMMER VILLAGE OF POPLAR BAY IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA TO RESTRICT THE USE OF FERTILIZERS AND HERBICIDES.

WHEREAS, Municipal Government Act being Chapter M-26 of the Revised Statutes of Alberta, 2000, Part 2, Sections 7 & 8 and amendments thereto, authorizes the Council of a local Municipality to pass a Bylaw regulating the safety, health and welfare of people and the protection of people and property;

AND WHEREAS there is a desire for all municipalities around Pigeon Lake to have restrictions on the use of lawn fertilizers;

AND WHEREAS the Summer Village of Poplar Bay would encourage other municipalities around the lake to pass similar bylaws;

NOW THEREFORE, the Council of the Summer Village of Poplar Bay, duly assembled, enacts as follows:

- 1. The use of fertilizers other than natural compost on lawns is prohibited within the Summer Village of Poplar Bay.
- 2. All chemical herbicides are prohibited within the Summer Village of Poplar Bay except for the control of noxious and prohibited noxious weeds as defined in the Weed Control Act.
- 3. Contravention of this Bylaw is subject to fines in accordance with Schedule "A" Penalties and Fees, attached hereto and forming part of Bylaw No. 298.
- 4. This bylaw comes into effect on the date of the third reading.

Read a first time this 27th day of March, 2015.

Read a second time this 27th day of March, 2015.

Read a third time and finally passed this 17th day of April, 2015.

Summer Village of Poplar Bay Schedule "A": Penalties and Fees (Forming part of Bylaw No. 239 – Restrict the Use of Fertilizers and Pesticides)

Any person who contravenes any provision of this Bylaw is guilty of an offence and is liable upon summary conviction to a fine of:

Not less than	\$50.00 and n	of more that	1 \$250 00 for	a first offence

Or

Not less than \$250.00 and not more than \$500.00 for subsequent offences.
